



New Year's Resolution to go Green!

As stewards of our planet, climate change is a large concern. St. Michael's has pledged to become carbon neutral by 2030, but what about us as individuals? Can we do the same in our own homes and lives? Here are a few tips. That gas furnace keeps you warm all winter, but releases greenhouse gases into the atmosphere. Turn down the thermostat about 5 degrees at night to save or when no one is at home. If you are not using some rooms you can close the heat vents and shut the doors. Electric space heaters can help you stay warm if you are only using a room or two during the day. What about your beloved gas range/oven? Get out that slow cooker, Instant Pot, toaster oven, rice cooker, and water kettle. Smaller dishes can be cooked in the toaster oven. Keep them close by so that you are more likely to use them.
